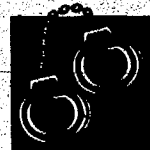

# Father to stand trial in robbery



Judge McKnight wants to deliver a message that gunmen will be dealt with harshly if caught robbing retailers. The judge, also upset that drugs were a factor in the recent robbery of a Meijer store, ordered a suspect to be tried.

A Westland father of three has been ordered to stand trial amid charges he robbed the Westland Meijer store at gunpoint. Statements made Thursday in 18th District Court indicated that Gary

Michael Crill, 27, had a crack cocaine problem when the Meijer store at Warren and Newburgh roads was robbed at 4:52 a.m. Jan. 30.

The case prompted 18th District Judge Gail McKnight to comment during Crill's preliminary examination Thursday that drugs "are tearing

at the guts of the community."

McKnight ordered Crill to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court for armed robbery and a felony firearms charge after a Meijer cashier testified Thursday that Crill robbed her at gunpoint while she was working.

Cashier Lisa Christine Deman testified that Crill bought a pack of chewing gum before he pulled a gun, robbed her and escaped with money that police said totaled \$374.

"He had a gun out, and he put it to my ribs," Deman said, adding that

Crill told her, "Give me all your money."

Crill's family members sat in the courtroom Thursday, and his mother wept during much of the hearing.

"For the family, this is a very tragic situation and a very heart-rending situation," McKnight said from the bench.

After Crill was ordered to stand trial, his mother began sobbing loudly as she left the courtroom, though others tried to comfort her.

# Clinic staffer accused of molestation

A 34-year-old Westland woman testified Thursday that she was molested while receiving physical therapy from a temporary worker at the Westland Medical Clinic.

Her testimony has resulted in the worker, Shahid Iqbal of Madison Heights, being ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on one count of fourth-degree criminal sexual conduct.

The woman, who asked that only her first name, Linda, be used, testified that she was molested while lying on a clinic bed — virtually undressed — as Iqbal massaged her for arthritis in her neck.

It was her third visit to the clinic, but the first time that her therapy had been administered by Iqbal, she said.

"He put both of his hands on my breasts, and he massaged me, and he molested me," she said. "I told him to stop. I was very humiliated. I was very intimidated. I was scared."

Linda testified that Iqbal also put his hands inside her panties, even though she told him to stop. He refused, leaned over and kissed her on the face, she testified.

"He kissed my cheek and told me how young and beautiful I was," she said.

Iqbal had been working at the clinic, on Merriman south of Palmer, on a

temporary basis, and Dec. 22 — the day of the alleged offense — was his last day there, said Westland police Sgt. Michael Terry.

Linda testified that she dressed and left the clinic, but that Iqbal followed her into the parking lot and to her van, where he apologized and told her that he was a professional.

"I became very scared," she said. "I didn't know what he was doing."

Following Linda's testimony, 18th District Judge Gail McKnight ruled that Iqbal should stand trial in Recorder's Court, even though his attorney, Lawrence Buckfire, argued that there was "no evidence of force or coercion" by Iqbal.

Iqbal, who is free on a \$3,000 bond,

could face a maximum sentence of two years in prison if convicted of fourth-degree criminal sexual conduct. He is scheduled to be arraigned in Recorder's Court on Feb. 25. A trial date has not been set.

The complainant said she believes that the alleged confrontation with Iqbal in the clinic parking lot may have been witnessed by others. She has asked that persons with information contact Sgt. Terry at the Westland Police Department's detective bureau, 721-6311.

Linda also said she hopes that her case will inspire others who may be victims of molestation to come forward.

"It's OK to tell," she said.

# Warmbier demands 'hit list' rumor source

A Wayne-Westland school trustee has demanded that a union representing principals reveal how it learned of a rumored "hit list" of administrators that Superintendent Larry Thomas supposedly wants to fire.

Trustee Fred Warmbier has suggested the school board should file a

state Freedom of Information Act request amid hopes of forcing the principals' union to reveal the rumor's source.

The union representing principals has demanded that Thomas provide the administrators with a copy of the supposed "hit list," which the superintendent has categorically denied he ever made.

The union also has filed a com-

plaint with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, asking that Thomas be forced to reveal the purported list. Thomas is consulting with the district's attorneys about the controversy.

Thomas has indicated that some administrators — resistant to changes that he has proposed since becoming superintendent July 1 — have fallen victim to unfounded ru-

mors that he wants to fire them.

Amid Thomas' denial of a hit list, Warmbier suggested during a board meeting Thursday that principals are asking Thomas "to do the impossible" by demanding a list that may not exist.

Warmbier didn't get immediate support from other board members.

Thomas already said he will refuse to accept the raise. The raise for the council will be implemented next month unless the council formally rejects the pay hike.

Other agenda items include approval of the preprogramming of federally funded block grant projects and the appointment of Marsha Bianconi to the economic development corporation.

The council is also scheduled to present a certificate of appreciation to Mervin Simpkins and Richard Hanoker who served nearly nine years each on the Municipal Service Bureau board of directors. The mayor didn't reappoint them for new terms.

# Officials address fears related to school choice

Wayne-Westland school officials have erased fears that students who enroll in schools outside of their attendance area could be forced to move out in mid-year because of classroom overcrowding.

A newly approved plan would guarantee students a seat in their school of choice for the entire year — if they have attended the school for at least 10 weeks.

The plan, approved Thursday by the school board, has resolved the district's "schools of choice" dilemma for the 1993-94 school year, although some board members still have reservations about it.

Some school officials fear that to guarantee students a seat in a school outside of their attendance area could mean that there might not be room for other pupils who move into the neighborhood.

New students moving in — even across the street from a school — could be told to attend another school because of over-

crowding, officials said.

"There's a question as to whether we could legally do that," conceded Bill Taylor, the district's associate superintendent for employee services.

School officials say it's unlikely such a situation would occur.

"But could it happen? Absolutely," Taylor said.

The school board last Monday had rejected a "schools of choice" plan that gave students no guarantees that they could finish the school year at a school outside of their home attendance area.

The board, demanding that students be guaranteed seats in their schools of choice after a certain point, sent the plan back to a committee of parents and administrators.

In a compromise move, the committee chose to guarantee students a seat after they have attended a school for 10 weeks — regardless of enrollment shifts or overcrowding.

Some board members, however, remain concerned that some students who have long attended

schools outside of their attendance area are receiving preferential treatment. Those students for years have been "grandfathered" into their schools of choice.

"I don't agree with that. I have a personal problem with that," school trustee Richard LeBlanc said.

Even so, he supported the plan because the committee had worked long hours on it.

The only board member to vote against the proposal was president Leonard Posey, who said he didn't agree that local districts have been forced by the state to develop a schools of choice plan.

He called schools of choice "a piece of garbage" and said he wishes the district "could put it in a trash can."

## Trial ordered in crack case

An Inkster man accused of selling crack cocaine to undercover Westland police officers has been ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court on drug charges.

Joseph Anthony Hamilton, 19, also faces trial amid charges he had a sawed-off shotgun hidden in the trunk of his car when police arrested him.

He was ordered to stand trial Thursday after he chose to waive a preliminary examination before 18th District Judge Gail McKnight.

Hamilton also has been charged with selling cocaine in Wayne. His preliminary examination in Wayne's 29th District Court has been scheduled for Wednesday.

If convicted, he could face a maximum sentence of 20 years in prison for selling cocaine and up to five years for the weapons charge, said Sgt. Timothy Abramski of the Westland police drug-enforcement unit.

Hamilton already had been placed on probation for cocaine possession stemming from charges last March in Garden City, Abramski said. He didn't serve any jail time on that charge because it was his first offense, police said.

Pending trial, Hamilton remained in the county jail last week and would have to post bonds totaling \$50,000 to be released from custody. He has pleaded not guilty.

Hamilton was arrested on the night of Feb. 4 amid allegations he sold crack cocaine to under-

cover police officers. He was arrested in his car near the intersection of Cherry Hill and Meriman, where the sawed-off shotgun was found in his trunk, police said.

The investigation also has resulted in misdemeanor charges of attempted marijuana possession against Hamilton and another defendant, David Earl Williams, 32, of Ypsilanti, Abramski said.

Hamilton will be tried in Recorder's Court because the cocaine and weapons charges are felonies. Williams' case, however, will be handled locally in 18th District Court because the charge against him is only a misdemeanor, police said.

Williams has been released from custody after posting bond.

Crill could face a maximum sentence of life in prison if convicted of armed robbery. He will face a mandatory two-year term if found guilty on the felony firearms charge.

The robber fled the Meijer store after the robbery. Crill was arrested a half-hour later when Livonia police stopped an alleged getaway vehicle on the Jeffries Freeway at Middlebelt, police said.

Livonia police turned Crill over to the Westland police, who found \$374 and a .25-caliber semiautomatic handgun in the car, Westland Detective Sgt. Marc Stobbe has said.

In court Thursday, Crill's attorney, Anthony Seaman, asked McKnight to reduce a \$100,000 bond that has kept Crill in jail since his arrest.

"I do not believe that Mr. Crill poses any threat to the community," Seaman told McKnight. "I beg the court to reduce bond to a manageable level."

But assistant Wayne County prosecutor Charles Grant told McKnight he would vehemently oppose any bond reduction because the robber had placed Meijer customers and employees "at risk."

McKnight sided with Grant, saying she feared Crill might flee if she lowered his bond.

"The probability is overwhelming that he will be sent to prison for this matter," McKnight said, adding that Crill would have "a strong incentive not to reappear" in court.

McKnight also sent a strong message that armed robberies will be dealt with harshly because, "The heartland of this community is its stores."

Westland's commercial stores draw thousands of shoppers not only from Westland, but also from many neighboring communities.

Crill has been scheduled to appear in Recorder's Court for a Feb. 25 arraignment. A trial date has not been set.

Moreover, his remarks sparked a dispute with his colleagues, who said he shouldn't discuss the volatile issue in a public meeting because of possible legal ramifications.

But Warmbier, visibly angered by the principals' position, refused to back down, even though the board's vice president, Vicki Welty, told him during the meeting that he was "out of order" for discussing the issue.

Warmbier told other board members that the principals' claims have called into question "the integrity of every board member here."

There were previous reports that Thomas compiled a "hit list" during a closed-door meeting attended by some board members. But Thomas has strongly denied he has identified administrators to be fired.

Thomas has indicated that general remarks he made about evaluating administrators have been taken out of context.

However, the district's principals have unanimously endorsed efforts to secure any purported "hit list," saying they want to protect themselves in the event that the list does exist.

If so, moms may call Strauss at 722-7620 during business hours.





# Livonia kills planned mini-amusement park

The plan to build an indoor, mini-amusement park at Wonderland Center died quickly and quietly Wednesday, less than a month after igniting a storm of protest.

The Livonia City Council sent a proposed zoning change that would have paved the way for the controversial "Exhilarama," or similar projects at two other major malls, back to the Livonia Planning Commission.

A March 31 public hearing in front of the council was canceled.

The commission — which voted 7-0 for a denial recommendation after an emotional, two-hour hearing Jan. 12 — will likely recommend no further action on the proposal.

Because the commission took the petitioner's role, there is no legal obligation to see the pro-

cess through to a council vote, according to city attorney Harry Tatigian.

Gerald "Joe" Taylor, council president, said Wednesday there was no support for the project.

After Wonderland owner Schostak Brothers Inc. talked to the council "I think they realized the wisdom of not putting the mall through that again," Taylor said.

Mayor Robert Bennett said it was "in the best interest of everyone to put the issue to rest."

Bennett backed the proposed park when it was introduced last summer but after more than 2,000 residents signed petitions against the plan he may or conceded it "might not be a good fit" with the neighborhood.

Kathy Beasley, one of the residents who spearheaded opposition to the project, publicly

thanked Bennett and the council after Wednesday's five-minute discussion and vote.

Residents' concerns centered around late-night noise and traffic and the proposed park's attraction as a "teen hangout."

Michael Polsinelli, Schostak vice president, declined comment on the collapse of the park project.

Polsinelli said Friday there were no clear plans on how the space that had been set aside for the planned 30,000 square-foot project would be filled.

"We could have easily leased it out two years ago" to conventional retailers, he said.

The indoor park, dubbed "Exhilarama" by its creator, would have featured a roller coaster, bumper cars, kiddie rides, video arcade and high-tech attractions like "Laser Tag" and "Virtual Reality."

# Lounge owner faces trial

The manager of Westland's Token Lounge has been ordered to stand trial on cocaine charges, although his attorney claims he was illegally searched during a Jan. 19 raid at the packed bar.

Ronald Baltrusz, 49, was ordered to stand trial in Detroit Recorder's Court after he appeared Thursday before 18th District Judge Gail McKnight for a preliminary examination.

The 49-year-old Livonia resident and a Token Lounge worker, Larry Wade Slusher of Wyandotte, were arrested on cocaine charges after police raided the bar following an undercover investigation.

Slusher had appeared in court one week before Baltrusz and had already been ordered to stand trial on two counts of cocaine delivery and one count of possession with intent to deliver.

In court Thursday, Baltrusz's attorney, Richard Monash, argued that the bar manager was illegally searched when police raided the lounge at 11:20 p.m. Jan. 19, a Tuesday.

But Judge McKnight ruled against him and decided that Baltrusz's case should be decided in Recorder's Court.

Monash refused to elaborate on his legal arguments and told the Observer to "stay tuned. More details to come."

Baltrusz, freed from custody after posting a \$2,500 bond, has been ordered to appear in Recorder's Court on Feb. 25 for an arraignment.

Trial dates have not yet been set for the two men.

Westland police were assisted by officers by Garden City, Livonia, Wayne and Inkster and other communities during an undercover investigation into possible drug dealings at the Token Lounge on Joy.

# Schools consider shorter day

Westland students in the Livonia district's middle and high schools will be asked to drop one of six subject for next year in case the school board reduces the school day to five hours.

The board of education Monday gave the go-ahead to the school administration to ask students in grades seven through 12 to indicate which one of six classes planned for next fall would be eliminated.

The move is a precautionary

measure for school officials as they begin discussions on the 1993-94 school budget and may reduce the school day by one hour for secondary school students.

It's not yet known how deep next year's budget cuts will be.

Last year, the district only asked high school seniors to pick the class they would drop if the sixth hour was dropped. Next fall, the directive covers six grades.

"We have not made any decisions," said Ken Watson, director of secondary education. "We're just collecting information to give

us the flexibility we may need."

The district had a five-hour day for secondary school students through the mid-1980s, but expanded to a six-hour day when it boosted graduation requirements to 22 credits.

If the sixth hour is cut, graduation requirements will also be reduced, Watson said.

"Requirements will be scaled back. This will not affect graduates in terms of the credits they need."

# Compromise tax plan would have softened hit to schools

The state Senate passed a bill to cut school property taxes 20 percent after Sen. David Honigman was unable to strike a deal softening the blow for schools.

Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, floated a compromise plan would have raised the property tax cut to 30 percent if voters replaced the lost school revenue by adding a penny to the sales tax.

"If I went too far one way, I couldn't get enough Republicans. If I went too far the other, no Democrats would back it," said Honigman after Wednesday's vote.

Instead the state Senate last week passed Gov. John Engler's proposed 20 percent cut in school operating property taxes over three years. The bill contains an amendment promising to replace the lost revenue (\$1.3 billion by the third year), but it contains no firm funding source.

Nineteen Republicans voted yes. All 16 Democrats, joined by Republican Fred Dillingham of Fowlerville, voted no.

Dillingham predicted the bill would fail in the House of Representatives. "You're creating further gridlock down the road," he warned his party.

## Looks OK to some

But the amendment made Senate Bill (SB 146) look good to Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, whose home base has five out of formula school districts that would be hard hit by a property tax cut.

"Once the amendment was added, I voted for the bill," he told 75 constituents who had written or called to protest it. Geake said the protests appeared to have been orchestrated by Livonia school officials, who said they stood to lose one-fourth of their \$100 million budget.

The promise also looked good

to Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, who faced heavy attacks from his out of formula schools for providing the swing vote in the Senate Finance Committee. "It reimburses schools and protects education," said Bouchard. "Our property taxes are far too high."

But it looked bad to Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, whose home school district would lose as much as Livonia. "We are promising some relief at the expense of many school districts," said Faxon. "I don't think it's realistic to expect the teachers to negotiate 20 percent reductions in pay or expect Consumers Power to negotiate a 20 percent reduction in utilities."

In formula districts (the 70 percent receiving state aid) would have much of their lost local taxes repaid by the state aid formula. But out of formula districts would take a straight loss.

## No vote on deal

Honigman's failed deal called for:

■ Passing Engler's 20 percent cut in school operating taxes



■ Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, whose district includes five out-of-formula school districts that would be hard hit by a property tax cut voted for the bill.

(achieved by paring assessments from 50 to 40 percent of market value over three years).

■ Placing a sales tax hike on the August ballot. If voters raised the tax from four cents to five, the money would be used to reimburse schools' lost revenue at \$545 per pupil. Out-of-formula districts would be guaranteed

state payment of the retirement costs and no cuts in their "categorical" aid (for buses and special education). Moreover, taxpayers would get a 30 percent cut in school property taxes, instead of the 20 percent offered by Engler.

If voters were to say no, the 20

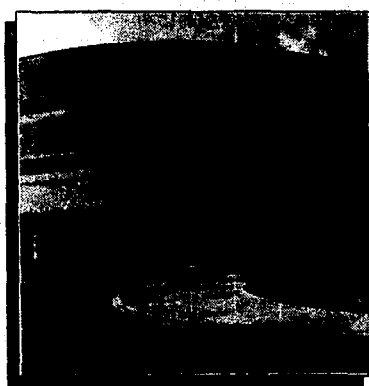

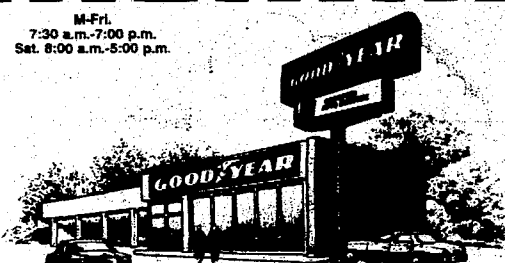

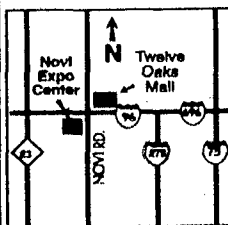

Special relationships between the NICU staff and patients' families develop during the average 30-day stay on the unit, similar to the MacKinnons' experience.

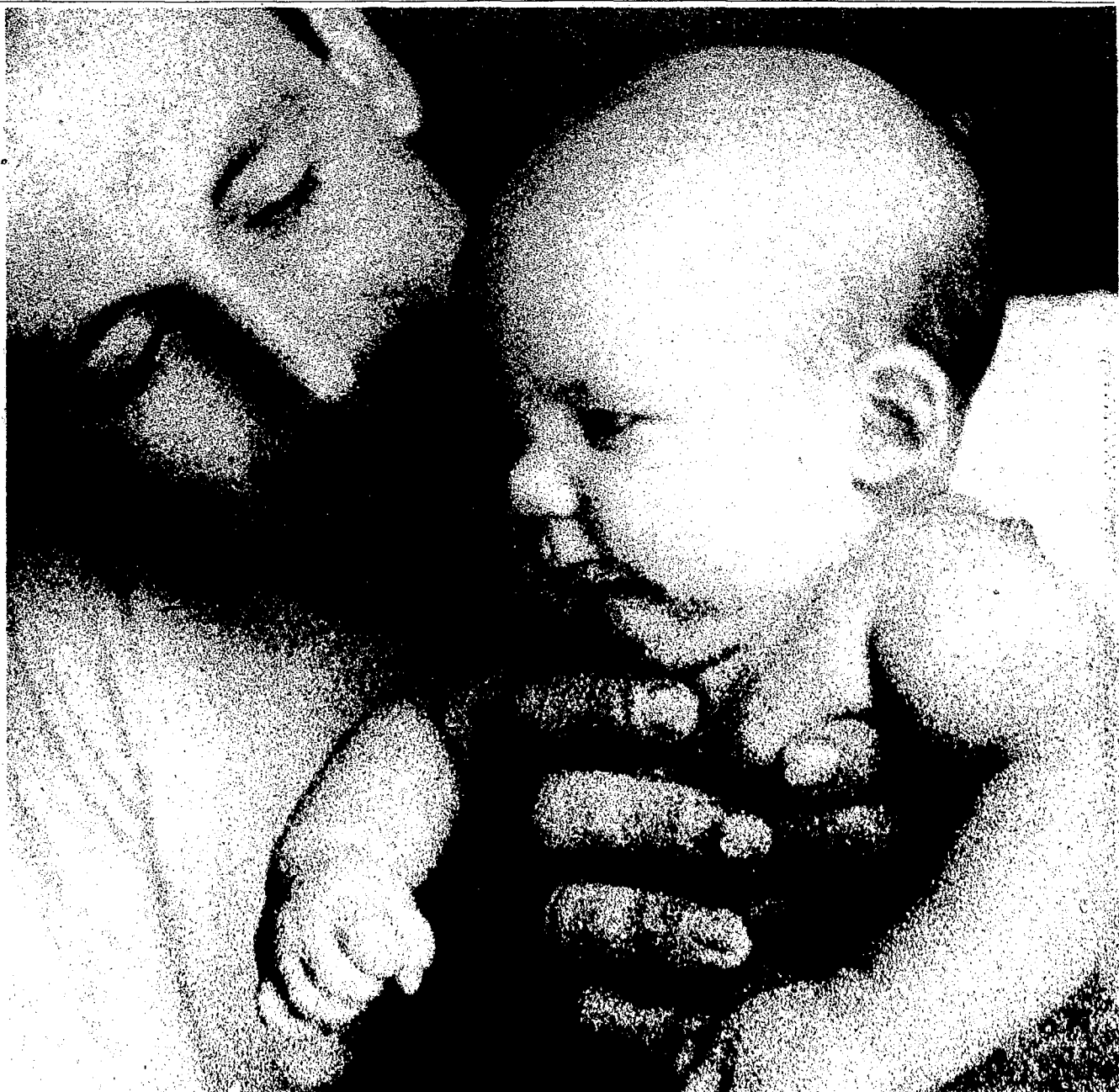

# Rouge River cleanup

## Project gets federal grant, wider scope

Pulling old tires out of the Rouge River just isn't enough anymore.

Friends of the Rouge, an organization that sponsors such cleanups of the river every year, has some high-powered help now that the federal government has stepped in.

With a federal grant of more than \$125 million and more expected to come, area officials are bent on cleaning the Rouge River in a wide-angle approach that includes communities from Bloomfield Township to Westland.

Called the Rouge River National Wet Weather Demonstration Project, the venture seeks to bring cleanliness to the Rouge by spreading awareness and retention basins all over the area that feeds the river.

"This is a great benefit to all taxpayers," said Oakland County Drain Commissioner George Kuhn. "It's fantastic!"

The first of its kind in the nation, this pilot project was pushed through congress by representatives William Ford, D-Ypsilanti Township, and John Dingell, D-Deerborn.

"We're not only fixing the problems in our backyard, but we're in the spotlight," said James Murray, Wayne County public works director. "Industrial countries throughout the world will be watching."

The idea is that every pollutant dumped on the ground or in the water all over the Rouge basin will eventually get into the river. "All of us who live in the Rouge basin live on the banks of the Rouge River," said James Ridgway, one of the project coordinators.

Observer & Eccentric communities involved in the project are Bloomfield Hills, Bloomfield Township, Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms, Franklin, Troy, West Bloomfield, Westland, Farmington, Farmington Hills, Livonia, Redford, Garden City, Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township.

"For years the Rouge River has been perhaps the greatest waste of a major waterway in America," said Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara, who spoke at a meeting last week of more than 200 representatives of the 48 communities in the Rouge basin. "Most people have never known

the Rouge as a place for recreation. They have only known it as a sewer. But with the help of the federal government the Rouge will once again be a place for boating, swimming and fishing."

The difference between this clean-up effort and past attempts is that, for the first time, the pollution created when water drains from roads, lawns and downspouts will be examined and addressed on a basinwide basis.

"We will help (citizens) understand how they've been part of the problem," said Wayne County Public Works Director James Murray. "(They'll) have to change their lawn care fertilizing methods, disconnect downspouts (that flow into sewers) and discover different ways to dispose of hazardous household waste."

Ridgway said that six billion gallons of untreated sewage still flow into the Rouge every year, much of it when sewers that combine sanitary and storm drain functions exceed capacity during heavy rains.

Ergo, part of the project calls for overflow holding tanks to be built in Redford, Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Southfield, Bloomfield Hills and five other cities.

Kuhn said the overflow tanks are about as big as football fields. "The size of the tanks is pretty big and awesome," he said.

Coordinating all this stuff will be a computer network called the geographical information system, which is supposed to enable officials to compile statistical information and generate computer images that can be used to predict the effects of rainfall on any give area of the Rouge drainage system. It should also be able to predict the effects of residents disconnecting downspouts from the sewer system.

The project is expected to take 20 years to complete, Murray said, and cost taxpayers more than \$1 billion in just the first 12 years. Most of that is expected to come from the federal government, but no can be certain that the water (or dollars in this case) won't be cut off before fruition time.

Another potential problem is convincing the 48 communities and 1.5 million residents in the Rouge basin to cooperate. "It's technically difficult. It's politically difficult. It's institutionally difficult," said Ridgway.

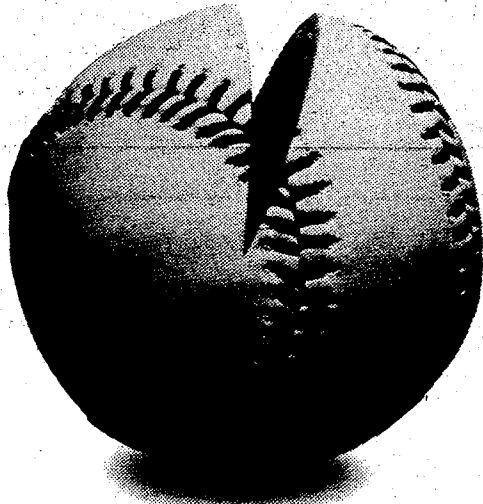

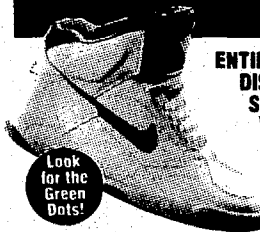

## Image expert tells how to dress stylishly



The best dressers don't wear fragrance to the office, never wear boots with zippers, and often don a hat. Image consultant Peg Treacy shares tips to help folks comb their malls and mainstreets to look like a million by spending wisely.

"You've got to think of yourself as a unique product and package yourself accordingly," Peg Treacy of Churchill Associates told a roomful of concerned consumers at The Community House in Birmingham last week.

"There are several rules of dressing that when followed never let you down. Of course when you break them, no one's going to come out and arrest you, but you won't have the edge that fashion practitioners have."

For the past 16 years as president of her Birmingham-based image consulting firm, Treacy has helped bankers, corporate leaders and would-be politicians polish their look and strengthen their image. Simple rules

help prevent shoppers from wasting money on garments that don't work, hairstyles that turn people off, and accessories that would be better left in the drawer.

She evaluates clothing purchases by cost per wearing, reminding shoppers that a "cheap" garment usually means poor fit, poor construction, and ends up as the most expensive item in a closet because it's not worn regularly.

"Better to buy quality," she said. "It looks better, fits better and you'll feel better in it and wear it often, thus making it an economical purchase."

When making cuts in a wardrobe budget eliminate purchases of colored hosiery, white or red shoes, patterned pieces and perfume.

"You don't really need these items," she pointed out. "Money spent on them could better be applied to a pair of quality shoes in a neutral color or good quality solid color blazer. Americans seem to think that having more is better than having quality and they'd rather have their closets full than stocked with quality garments."

"There's nothing wrong with being seen in the same thing twice," she argued. "Where did we ever get the idea that it's a fashion taboo? Europeans don't share our views. They choose quality over quantity everytime." And when you can't afford quality there are tricks to make it look like you can.

"Quality boots never have zippers," Treacy advised. "So don't buy boots that do. They look cheap. Avoid shiny fabrics. They always look inexpensive. To upgrade a garment, change the buttons to a higher quality, replace a same-fabric tie-belt with one that's leather, and buy tasteful, fun pieces of jewelry instead of faddish,

dangle, cheap-looking pieces. You don't need to have expensive jewelry, just well-designed pieces."

Perfume, much to the audience's surprise, is actually a detriment to a classy package, Treacy said.

"Co-workers do not like fragrance in the office," she said. "Some can be too heavy and induce sneezing, headaches and allergies in those nearby. Better not to wear fragrance to the office at all."

Treacy said "everything's better with a hat," and advised female shoppers to include a chapeau or two in their wardrobe budget.

"Men love women to wear hats," she said with a laugh. "Wear a hat to a restaurant and you'll get the best table. You make the place look like a class act."

Treacy ended with a reminder that to look good on the outside a person needs to look good on the inside as well. She suggested compiling a list of your 10 best attributes and reviewing them mentally each morning before you get dressed.

## Mardi Gras in Detroit suburbs brings New Orleans party north

Hosting an authentic New Orleans-style Mardi Gras party in a suburban Detroit home is no quick trick.

However local malls and main-street merchants are anxious to oblige those determined to give it a try on Tuesday, Feb. 23.

The traditional Mardi Gras decorations in purple (for justice), green (for faith) and gold (for power) are available at stores like the 1/2 Off Card Shop, Parti Giant in Rochester, The Paper Party Place in Farmington, and Party Parade in Canton.

Record shops can provide cassettes of Dixieland jazz. No party is complete without renditions of *When The Saints Go Marchin' In*, *Tiger Rag*, *Handa Wanda*, and *St. Louis Blues*.

According to Gary Bice of Bloomfield Hills, a Prudential stock broker, former resident of New Orleans, and Mardi Gras aficionado, a crawfish boil will top off the event.

"I usually buy crawfish at Superior Fish in Royal Oak or Fishers Market in Birmingham where it can be ordered," he said. "Add the crawfish to a boiling pot of water and drop in a

package of Zatarain's mix. Eat 'em New Orleans style — break 'em in half, pinch the tails and suck the heads. It's wonderful food especially when fresh. I also prepare a jambalaya, that's poor man's stew, with rice, chicken, sausage and peppers."

Traditional King Cakes, a coffee cake made with danish dough and topped with multi-colored sugars, can be shipped next day delivery from Gambino's Bakery in New Orleans for \$19.95 by dialing Accent Annex 1-800-322-2368. A small, plastic baby is baked into one slice, determining the "king" of the party and the next person to serve a King Cake.

Jo Rivers, marketing director for the New Orleans School of Cooking in Louisiana said hosts should not forget to toss their guests a few doubloons and plastic beads like those thrown from Mardi Gras floats.

"Oh how we love those beads," she said with a laugh. "We fight for them. Scream for them. Beg for them. Some bare themselves for them. The next day, of course, at home looking at them, you ask yourself, Why did I fight for these things?"

## Local landscape lost as resource to feed hungry

**D**iving Hines Drive in Wayne County on an almost daily basis, I've thought about and plotted ways to turn the Canada geese that proliferate there into dinner.

There's the .20 gauge in the closet, but that's best left there. A wet towel thrown over one at midnight is one idea, or a sling shot.

But the ideas are quickly dismissed.

What we've done to our feathered friends is disgusting. We've fed them so much bread that we've made them too lazy to fend for themselves, and their numbers are growing to the pest stage in Livonia. But then part of the problem is our own laziness. Thoughts of a goose dinner don't stay around long.

Liberals with a heart can screw up a free lunch — their own. Native Americans have the idea that one shouldn't interfere with an animal unless it's for a good cause — dinner. It's a good idea.

But there are others. I once knew an old Italian man who came to America to work as a janitor in a downtown Detroit building. He knew little English, but an Italian-speaking friend inter-

One writer I know says his family got through the lean years by eating blue-bird pie.

We've become either too rich or lazy from welfare and food stamps to see the riches in the landscape around us and too regulated by government to act.

In the old days, Livonia and other communities wouldn't have had the problem of devising the dreaded government program to do something about having too many geese.

It never would have developed if there were enough old Italians around like my friend. And as for a weed cutting program, a village of Greek ladies would have kept that problem in check.

And all the while they would have been putting food on their tables.

## Journalists forget truth carries its own magic

**B**e happy Bill Clinton just wanted to be president and not head of a '60s cult, because we might still be beaded, braided and barefoot.

Clinton was simply spellbinding at last week's Town Meeting in Southfield, the first of many he intends to create across the United States. His ability to relate to a group and to each individual is a gift. He is the ultimate salesman, the bully preacher, charisma personified.

He moved at least two people to tears. One young audience member burst into tears as a reporter asked her to describe her experience. "I don't want him to leave," the young girl sobbed.

Later on Nightline, also telecast from Southfield, a native of Puerto Rico cried as she said Clinton's answer to her question made her feel for the first time that her people might get

statehood. She'd lobbied every president since Nixon, she said.

But Nightline host Ted Koppel wasn't about to let one audience member after another relate that:

■ Yes, they felt the president was really listening to them.

■ No, they didn't think the Town Hall had been in vain.

There must be someone here who was disappointed, Koppel wheedled and cajoled. Finally one man got up and mildly made the point that the president still must turn his words into deeds.

As a journalist, I understand Koppel's desire to get more sides of a story. But this time he was after the side many journalists wanted to tell.

We wanted to hear that the event had been staged; that people hadn't been able to ask follow-up questions; that it was just one more campaign

speech.

We wanted to hear them say that it is only journalists who ask the tough questions; who follow up with the tougher ones; who see through rhetoric.

We wanted to hear that they were upset that we had been herded into a makeshift press room in a garage on the grounds of the WXYZ-TV complex and forced to watch the whole thing on

television — just as they did.

And it didn't matter whether we were from the New York Times or the Southfield Eccentric.

This was a town hall for the people.

It didn't need a middleman to describe and interpret. It was there for all to see and come to their own conclusions.

In fact the only "other side" which surfaced on Nightline was a surge of antagonism toward journalists — as audience members disagreed with Koppel that it was wrong for the president to bypass the Fourth Estate.

When did we become such experts — interviewing each other on Sunday morning talk shows as often as we interview the people who make the news. We are not newsmakers. We are reporters.

If Watergate was the pinnacle of excellent journalism, what we now have may be the bottom. NBC News faking

the explosion of a General Motors pickup truck is a scar all journalists must bear.

Following Watergate, college journalism departments were flooded with young people signing up for reporting classes. Their eye was on becoming the next Woodward and Bernstein.

The Oakland University classes I've talked to most recently are flooded with young people taking news writing classes — only because it's required to fulfill their communications major. Then they'll go on to public relations or advertising.

That hurts. But we have brought it on ourselves.

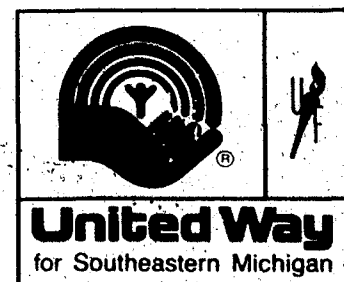

# Stadium study funds legal - officials

The Wayne County Building Authority is under fire from county commission audit committee chair Susan Hubbard, D-Dearborn, for spending money on research involving Tiger Stadium.

Hubbard said the \$177,000 that the Building Authority spent on stadium research in 1991 and 1992 violates a promise Executive Edward McNamara made to the commission not to commit county dollars to a stadium project without a vote of the people.

However, Building Authority executive director David Katz

(who is also an assistant county executive under McNamara) said the authority is a separate legal entity and not officially part of county government.

"Nothing illegal, immoral or dishonest took place," Katz said. "The county commissioners are not the Building Authority."

Bill Polankowski, the chairman of the Building Authority board, said the authority usually gets its project research "seed money" back as soon as the bonds are sold to fund construction of a given project. Such will be the case with the stadium seed money, he added, if a new stadium is built.

Referring to "politicians playing games," Polankowski said "everything we do is above board. I told the commissioners that anything they want, we'll do for them."

Ramona Henderson, the county's auditor general, said the commission's ire has risen because the Building Authority spent money on the stadium without commission approval. "I understand what (Hubbard) is after," Henderson said. "She wants some internal control" over the Building Authority.

Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, said he doesn't believe

the expenditure of Building Authority money on stadium research is a breach of McNamara's promise.

Hubbard's criticism, Amann said, is not valid. "Yeah, you know Susan," he said. "She's going to lose credibility if she goes off on a witch hunt. She's trying to rehash some year-old news."

Hubbard intends to submit a proposed amendment to the Building Authority's articles of incorporation at Thursday's commission meeting. The amendment would require the authority to follow stricter guidelines in bidding out work.

"It never got voted on," said Honigman, whose western Oakland district includes homes with soaring assessments and out of formula schools.

"The Democrats wouldn't go with that. The Democrats wanted the sales tax in place before the property tax cut."

Democrat Faxon agreed. "We said it (sales tax) had to be in place (before the property tax cut). We offered three senators to negotiate."

After the deal collapsed, Honig-

man, joined by Bouchard and Mat Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, won support for the amendment by which the state promised to replace lost revenue.

That promise was worthless, in Faxon's view. "It (the bill) says 'we shall do this.' If the money's not there, you can't do it. You can't force the Legislature to appropriate money. It's like having a bank account with no money," Faxon said.

**Narrowly drawn**

SB 146 is narrowly drawn to apply only to K-12 school taxes, not

city, township, county, community college or metropark taxes.

A clarifying amendment said the cut doesn't apply to school taxes that fund a public library or community college.

Senate Republicans pushed the bill through in a single day, bypassing the normal procedure of discussing it on "general orders" one day and passing it the second.

Faxon protested: "To put this bill on a fast track serves no one."

Dillingham said his GOP caucus used speed "to meet a political end, not a policy end."

Sen. Virgil Smith, D-Detroit, complained Republicans "rammed it through."

Senate Republicans said they pushed the bill so that the House could take it up in February, when Republican Willis Bullard of Milford chairs the Taxation Committee. In March the committee will be chaired by Democrat Lyn Jondahl of Okemos, who is unlikely to take it up.

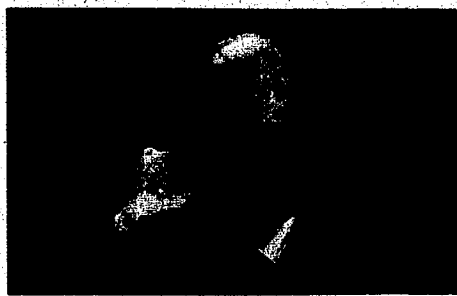

On rainy days, I pop one of Julia's eight cooking videos into my VCR, watch her prepare duck à l'orange, and silently mimic her cartooned voice. When I'm searching for a recipe for an infallible bread, chowder or creamy flan, I refer to one of her many books, especially "The Way to Cook," (Knopf, copyright 1989).

### Grande dame

There's little doubt that Julia is by far the doyenne, the grande dame, and the epitome of good cooks throughout the world. Martha Stewart professes to entertain. Lynne Rossette Kasper might know about Italian cuisine, and Heloise can teach me how to clean my stovetop but, Julia deserves credit for instilling basic cooking knowledge to millions of folks like you and me.

If you cook, and if you're reading this, you probably love to cook. Undoubtedly there's a Julia Child cookbook somewhere in your cookbook library. If you have yet to pick up a copy of "The Way to Cook" there is no better time. This book is chock full of Julia's favorite master recipes, and contains tips that can turn a ball of sticky dough into some of the best French bread you've ever sunk your teeth into.

### Helpful tips

The latest rage sweeping the metro area is root vegetables, and once again, Julia shows you how. One might say that Anne Willan, author of the "The Look and Cook Series," which accompanies recipes with step-by-step color photographs, borrowed Julia's thought that in addition to great recipes, a cookbook should contain precise photographs.

Put a pot of spicy jambalaya or gumbo on the stove to simmer, invite friends over, and you'll be thinking about having fun, instead of how cold and ugly it is outside.

If you're Catholic, Feb. 23, also called "Fat Tuesday," is the last day to indulge in sweets, and other foods that are forsaken during Lent, the period of fasting and penance between Ash Wednesday, Feb. 24, and Easter, which this year falls on April 11.

"The word carnival means farewell to meat," said Carol Haskins, executive chef at the Townsend Hotel in Birmingham.

"Most of the Mardi Gras foods are fun foods to eat. There's a traditional cake called a King's Cake. It's a ring-shaped cake made from rich yeast dough with candied fruit peel, topped with a glaze of carnival colors — white, yellow, green and cherries. They put a bean or pecan half inside, and whoever finds it is the Mardi Gras king or queen."

Maureen Kelly of Troy, Catherine Quaine of Farmington Hills, and Geraldine Carroll of Bloomfield Hills are busy getting ready for the second annual Mardi Gras Carnival Feb. 20 at St. Anne's Church in Detroit.

The event, sponsored by the Gabriel Richard Historical Society, is a benefit to raise money for the restoration of the church building and grounds. Established in 1701, St.

Anne's is the oldest Catholic parish in Detroit, and the second oldest in the country.

The carnival will take place in a series of connected, heated marquis tents, and feature hors d'oeuvres, an open bar and live entertainment including Dixieland favorites from Percy Gabriel's New Orleans Band.

"Mardi Gras is mostly a celebration of good, hearty, substantial foods," said Jeffrey Gabriel, Certified Master Chef and director of the culinary arts program at Schoolcraft College in Livonia.

Schoolcraft's Mardi Gras celebration Feb. 19 and 20 will feature the Red Garter Band, harmonica virtuoso Peter "Madcat" Ruth and Schoolcraft's SCool Jazz Vocal Group.

The menu includes Seafood Jambalaya — a blend of rice, ham, red peppers, shrimp, tomatoes and okra seasoned with Tabasco sauce, garlic and cilantro. Jambalayas are also made with chicken, crabmeat, oysters and sausages. The rice absorbs most of the broth the meat or seafood is cooked in.

Gumbo, a hearty soup made with chicken, shrimp, ham and oysters either alone or in combination, is an-

other food that comes to mind when talking about Louisiana cuisine and Mardi Gras. In gumbo the rice is cooked separately. At serving time, a mound of rice is placed in a soup bowl, and the gumbo is poured over it.

Marcia Sikarskie who is teaching "Mardi Gras — New Orleans Style" at Kitchen Glamor stores Feb. 16 to 19, describes Louisiana food as hearty and robust.

"They use a lot of seafood, chicken and pork in their dishes," she said, "and lots of garlic, pepper, sage, thyme, paprika and bay leaf. The food gets spicier the further south you go because the climate is warmer, and spice was used as a preservative."

Vegetables common in Cajun and Creole cooking include tomatoes, onions, celery, green pepper, and okra.

Coffees flavored with orange and lemon peel or cinnamon are traditional. For dessert serve pralines, which according to legend were named for a French butler, Praslin, who had almonds coated with sugar for his master as a precaution against indigestion.

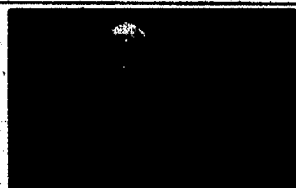

Some early French customs were quite uncivilized. As time went on, they adopted many culturally civil traditions still practiced today.

"They made masquerading at balls popular and

they introduced the boeuf gras, a huge bull, either real or manmade that came to symbolize the celebration," LaBorde narrates. "Fat Tuesday," a direct translation from the French became the French name for carnival day and is now known in every language as Mardi Gras.

By the late 19th century, the celebration of Mardi Gras waned in France. Ironically, this is the time it began to flourish in New Orleans and it is there that the feast is most celebrated today.

History lesson over, let's get down to celebrating and matching wine with Cajun and Creole cooking. The heart of Cajun food is southern French country cooking. Cajuns use the bounty of local crawfish, as well as chicken and pork, which is often smoked.

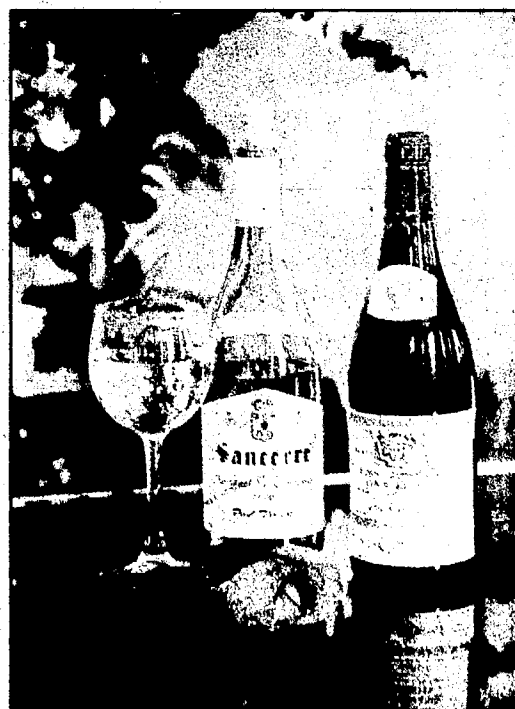
File powder, parsley, bay leaves, cayenne, black pepper and hot peppers are the principal seasonings. All preparations are accompanied by rice.

Rice balances hotness from the seasonings and allows solid wine harmonies. Unlike Cajun, Creole food originated in New Orleans and is a mixture of French, Spanish, Italian, American Indian and African traditions.

Louisiana's renowned chef Paul Prudhomme contends that "Today, in homes, there is still a distinction between Cajun and Creole cooking; in restaurants, little distinction remains." That's why Prudhomme refers to the two together as Louisiana cooking.

With Louisiana-style crabmeat, crawfish, shrimp or oysters, champagne or sparkling wine works well against well-seasoned preparations as long as they're not too hot.

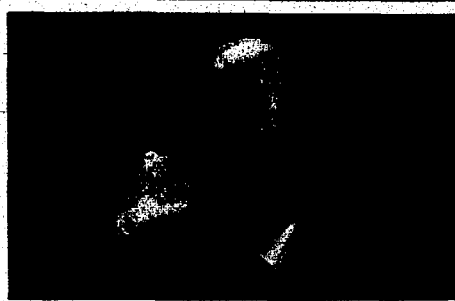

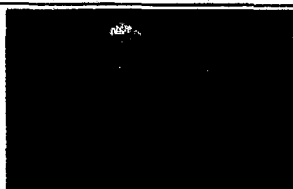

History lesson over, let's get down to celebrating and matching wine with Cajun and Creole cooking. The heart of Cajun food is southern French country cooking. Cajuns use the bounty of local crawfish, as well as chicken and pork, which is often smoked.

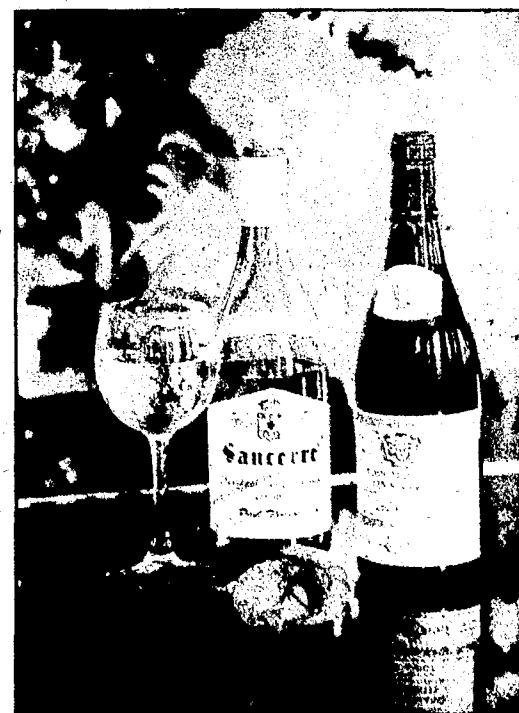
File powder, parsley, bay leaves, cayenne, black pepper and hot peppers are the principal seasonings. All preparations are accompanied by rice.

Rice balances hotness from the seasonings and allows solid wine harmonies. Unlike Cajun, Creole food originated in New Orleans and is a mixture of French, Spanish, Italian, American Indian and African traditions.

Louisiana's renowned chef Paul Prudhomme contends that "Today, in homes, there is still a distinction between Cajun and Creole cooking; in restaurants, little distinction remains." That's why Prudhomme refers to the two together as Louisiana cooking.

With Louisiana-style crabmeat, crawfish, shrimp or oysters, champagne or sparkling wine works well against well-seasoned preparations as long as they're not too hot.

# Hearty dishes perfect for Mardi Gras party

**SHRIMP CREOLE**  
½ cup butter or margarine  
2 onions, finely chopped  
2 cloves garlic finely minced  
2 celery stalks, finely chopped  
2 pounds raw shrimp, peeled and deveined  
4 tablespoons flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons chili powder  
2 cups milk  
4 tablespoons catsup  
2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley  
chicken broth or white wine to thin sauce  
Use a heavy skillet — melt butter and sautee vegetables. Add shrimp and sautee a few minutes longer.

Combine the salt, flour and chili powder and add to the skillet. Gradually add the milk, and cook for five minutes at low heat.  
Add catsup and parsley. Cover and continue to cook an additional 10 to 12 minutes. Add chicken broth or white wine to thin sauce to desired consistence. Serve on fluffy white rice tossed with lightly sauteed sliced mushrooms. Serves 4 to 6.

**STUFFED MUSHROOMS**  
2 dozen mushrooms, stems finely chopped  
olive oil  
4 tablespoons margarine  
½ cup crabmeat flaked  
1 onion, finely minced

1 stalk celery, finely minced  
1 garlic clove, finely minced  
½ teaspoon salt  
dash cayenne pepper  
3 slices white bread, made into crumbs in blender  
Parmesan cheese  
Wash and remove stems. Brush each cap with oil inside and out. Place on cookie sheet. Melt margarine in skillet and saute onion, celery and garlic until soft. Add finely chopped stems, flaked crabmeat, parsley, salt, pepper and bread crumbs. Stir until blended. Mound each cap with this mixture and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 325 degrees for 25 minutes.

**CAFE BRULOT**  
The peel of 1 orange  
The peel of 1 lemon  
36 ounces hot brewed French roast dark coffee  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup bourbon  
1 tablespoon whole cloves  
2 sticks cinnamon  
Put all the ingredients except coffee in a pot and mash together while bringing to a boil.  
Remove from the heat, set the mixture on fire. When the alcohol has burned off, add coffee. Let the

mixture stand a few minutes to improve the flavor. Strain and serve.

**JAMBALAYA**  
2 tablespoons oil  
8 pieces chicken, trimmed of all excess fat and skin  
4 tablespoons salted butter  
½ cup finely chopped onion  
2 cloves garlic, minced  
½ cup finely chopped green pepper  
½ cup finely chopped celery  
1 cup peeled, seeded and chopped fresh tomatoes, or 1 1-pound can peeled tomatoes, peeled and chopped  
¼ cup finely chopped parsley  
1½ cups long-grain rice  
3½ cups boiling water  
1 teaspoon salt  
¼ to ½ teaspoon cayenne pepper  
¼ teaspoon dried thyme, or a few fresh sprigs of thyme  
1 bay leaf  
Freshly ground black pepper  
¼ pound boiled ham, julienned  
½ pound uncooked shrimp, peeled and deveined

Chopped parsley for garnish  
In a large, heavy saute pan, heat the oil and brown the chicken well on all sides. Remove and set aside.  
In the same pan, melt the butter. Add the onion and sautee over low heat for 5 minutes until softened, stirring often to prevent coloring. Add the garlic and saute a few more minutes, stirring constantly. Add the pepper and celery and saute a few more minutes. Add the tomatoes and cook until the mixture has thickened and most of the liquid has evaporated. Stir in the parsley and rice and saute until the rice is hot.

Pour the boiling water over the rice mixture and stir in the spices and seasoning. Return the chicken to the pan. Bring the liquid to a boil, cover, and simmer until the chicken is cooked and most of the liquid has been absorbed by the rice, about 35 minutes.

Add the ham and shrimp to the rice, cover and continue cooking until the shrimp is pink and the ham is heated through, about 5 minutes.

Fluff the jambalaya with a fork to distribute the ingredients and serve sprinkled with additional parsley.

A grassy-style sauvignon blanc can't be beat. You can stick with French and use a Sancerre from the Loire Valley or choose one from California. These are some of the best: 1990 Paul Thomas Sancerre, Chavignol "Les Comtesse" (\$16), 1991 Lockwood Sauvignon Blanc (\$7), 1991 Simi Sauvignon Blanc (\$9), 1991 Fetzer Barrel Select Sauvignon Blanc (\$10).

With Andouille, the most popular Cajun smoked pork sausage, a spicy southern Rhone wine, such as a Chateaufort-du-Pape, is in order. Dry Creek Winery's owner Dave Stare, the grandson of a former Louisiana governor, is a Louisiana cooking aficionado. Wherever possible, winery events are centered around his food preferences.

Dry Creek Winery chef Richard Nolleaux makes the best Duck and Andouille Gumbo we've tasted

(see recipe inside). Dry Creek Zinfandel is used in the recipe and a glass of it makes a great match at the table.

With gumbos and duck preparations, we also like pinot noir. Here again, you can elect a French or red Burgundy or one of the bottlings from the Carneros region of California.

Ham dishes or tasso call for a rose or light red wine from Provence or one of the newer market entries from the Languedoc-Roussillon region of southern France.

The strong flavors of jambalaya and the fact that it often contains tomatoes make it difficult to pair with wine. Here the recommendation is a dark premium beer or Bass Ale.

# Dry Creek Winery chef shares recipe

**DUCK AND ANDOUILLE GUMBO**  
Seasoning mix:  
1½ teaspoons garlic powder  
1 teaspoon dried thyme  
½ teaspoon ground sage  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon each black pepper, white pepper and cayenne  
1 teaspoon ground juniper berries  
Roux:  
2 cups vegetable oil  
2 cups flour  
Remaining ingredients:  
5 cups minced white onions  
2 cups minced green onion

(white and green parts)  
1½ cups minced yellow bell pepper  
3 cups minced celery  
4 cups duck meat (from breast, leg, thigh)  
3 tablespoons vegetable oil  
2 andouille sausages, diced ¼ inch (approximately 1½ cups)  
1½ cups dry red wine, Dry Creek Zinfandel  
5 quarts rich duck stock (or chicken stock)  
¼ cup Worcestershire sauce  
2 tablespoons finely minced garlic  
2 tablespoons salt  
1½ teaspoons cayenne  
¾ cup tomato puree  
Saute andouille in a large frying

pan for about 10 minutes until slightly brown. Remove with slotted spoon and set aside. Pour off any remaining grease. On medium high heat, add 3 tablespoons vegetable oil and brown off the duck meat that's been mixed with all of the seasoning mix. Stir for about 7 minutes until duck cooks slightly. Remove duck to same plate as andouille; deglaze pan with 1½ cups dry red wine.

In large heavy bottomed pot make a roux with oil and flour. When it turns a mahogany color, add white onions, green onions, yellow bell pepper and celery. Stir constantly for about 8 minutes, add duck stock, deglazing liquid from above and bring to a boil. Reduce to medium heat and add garlic, duck/andouille mixture, salt, cayenne,

Worcestershire and tomato puree. Stirring occasionally, let cook over medium heat for about 2 hours. Skim surface occasionally.

Refrigerate overnight. The next day, remove any fat that remains on top. Reheat for service.

Serve in large soup bowl, add ½ cup cooked rice. Gumbo can be made hotter with your choice of Tabasco, etc. This gumbo is even more flavorful after freezing and reheating.

Makes approximately, 20 — 10 ounce servings.

Chef's note: Andouille, a Cajun smoked pork sausage, is a staple in New Orleans meat markets, but not widely available outside Louisiana. The Polish smoked sausage — kielbasa, can be used as a substitute.





# Spend some time in the kitchen with Julia Child

See Larry Jones column on Taste front. Recipes from Julia Child's "The Way to Cook," (Knopf, 1989, hardcover \$50)

## AIR O BOUIDO (GARLIC SOUP)

1 or 2 large heads of garlic, (2 heads are not too much),

the unpeeled garlic cloves separated and mashed  
2 quarts water  
seasonings:  
2 teaspoons salt  
a big pinch of freshly ground white pepper  
2 whole cloves

¼ teaspoon sage  
¼ teaspoon thyme  
1 medium imported bay leaf  
6 parsley sprigs  
3 tablespoons fruity olive oil  
3 egg yolks  
¼ cup olive oil  
Combine all the listed ingred-

ients except the egg yolks and olive oil in a saucepan, bring to a boil, and simmer partially covered for 30 minutes. Strain into a bowl, pressing the juices out of the ingredients, and return to the saucepan.

Correct seasonings. Whisk the egg yolks in a soup tureen or a mixing bowl for a minute or two until thick and sticky; by droplets, whisk in the olive oil to make a thick, mayonnaise like cream.

Just before serving, beat a ladleful of hot soup into the egg yolk mixture and then gradually whisk in the remainder of the soup. Serve immediately, passing bread and grated Parmesan cheese separately. Serves four to six.

## GRATIN OF RUTABAGA OR WINTER SQUASH

1 ½ pounds rutabaga or winter squash, cut into a ¾-inch dice, 4 to 5 cups  
½ teaspoon freshly grated ginger

1 large clove garlic, minced  
3 tablespoons butter  
3 tablespoons flour  
2 cups milk  
3 tablespoons fresh white bread crumbs  
3 tablespoons grated Swiss cheese

Place the diced rutabaga or squash in a steamer basket with ginger and garlic. Cover and steam

over 1-inch of water for about 10 minutes, until almost tender. Remove the steamer, boil down the steaming liquid to ¼ cup; whisk into the sauce.

Make a white sauce by melting the butter in a saucepan and whisking in the flour and milk and cooking over low heat until thickened. Preheat oven to 325 degrees.

Fold the rutabaga or winter squash into the white sauce, and turn into a buttered baking dish. Spread on the crumbs and the cheese. Bake in the middle level of an oven for 1 ½ hours; the top should be nicely browned and the sauce almost completely absorbed. Serves 6.

## Turkey potpie lean, delicious

AP — Satisfy your family's hankering for a hot and hearty meal with old-fashioned potpie, leaned up for the nineties. The filling contains nutritious vegetable juice cocktail (instead of high-fat cream), lots of chunky vegetables and morsels of turkey or chicken breast meat. To replace the usual buttery pastry, a quick-fix biscuit crust tops the filling. You never know — your new-fashioned potpie may just very well become an old favorite.

### TURKEY POTPIE

6-ounce can vegetable juice cocktail  
4 teaspoons cornstarch  
2 cups sliced small zucchini and/or yellow summer squash  
1 ½ cups chopped tomatoes  
1 tablespoon dried minced onion  
½ teaspoon dried Italian seasoning, crushed  
¼ teaspoon garlic powder  
¼ teaspoon pepper  
8 ounces cubed cooked turkey or chicken (1 ½ cups)  
¾ cup packaged biscuit mix  
¼ cup skim milk  
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese  
1 teaspoon dried parsley flakes

In a small mixing bowl stir together 2 tablespoons of the vegetable juice cocktail and cornstarch; set aside.

In a large saucepan combine zucchini and/or summer squash, tomatoes, onion, Italian seasoning, garlic powder, pepper and remaining vegetable juice cocktail. Bring to boiling. Add turkey or chicken and cornstarch mixture. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Reduce heat and keep warm.

For biscuit topping, in a medium mixing bowl combine biscuit mix, milk, Parmesan cheese and parsley; stir just until moistened.

Transfer the hot chicken mixture to a 1 ½-quart casserole. Immediately drop biscuit topping in four mounds atop chicken mixture. Place casserole on a baking sheet. Bake, uncovered, in a 400-degree

F oven for 15 to 20 minutes or until the topping is golden. Makes 4 servings.

## Parfait easy to fix

AP — Sumptuous old-fashioned desserts can be surprisingly quick and easy to prepare when you use a packaged pudding mix and ready-made frozen poundcake.

Assemble individual servings by layering the vanilla pudding, toasted cubes of poundcake and strawberry slices in tall parfait glasses.

### INSTANT TRIFLE PARFAIT

3 cups poundcake, cut in ½-inch cubes (one-half of a 10 ¼-ounce frozen poundcake)  
3 ¼-ounce package instant vanilla pudding mix  
2 cups milk  
½ teaspoon grated orange peel  
1 ½ cups sliced strawberries  
4 whole strawberries

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. On a jellyroll pan, place cake cubes in a single layer. Bake in a 350-degree F oven until golden, about 15 minutes; turning once. Remove from the oven; set aside to cool. Reserve 12 cubes for garnish. While cake is toasting, in a medium bowl prepare pudding according to package directions using milk and orange peel. When pudding has thickened, stir in cooled cake cubes. In each of four parfait or 10-ounce wineglasses, place a layer of strawberries, top with ½ cup pudding mixture. Continue simmering just until shrimp and corn are cooked through and noodles are tender, about 3 to 5 minutes.

## Take your pick of precious pears

AP — The annual parade of domestically grown pears provides luscious fresh fruit from late summer through winter, a time when many other fresh fruits are either higher priced or just unavailable. Yet, like apples, no one pear variety lasts the entire season. And, just as in the case of apples, some varieties fare better than others for cooking.

### Common pear varieties

Here are some of the common pear varieties you'll see in your market during the cooler months, with some hints on how to cook or serve them.

Anjou: This egg-shaped, winter pear wears a pale green, yellow-green, or red skin. Because it is sweet and juicy, it is good for salads and snacks.

Bartlett: The yellow or red Bartlett is bell-shaped. Available in the summer and fall, this popular variety is good for canning and cooking because it holds its shape. It also is an excellent pear for eating fresh.

Bosc: This long-necked winter variety has golden brown skin with russeting or browning. The fresh fruit has a creamy texture and is full of flavor. The Bosc holds its shape well during cooking, so it is a good choice for baking, poaching and broiling.

Comice: This chubby, green, or greenish-yellow winter pear has a thick, short stem and sometimes a red blush on one side. It is not recommended for cooking or baking but is considered a good pear to eat fresh, especially with cheese, because it is very sweet and juicy.

Forelle: A small, golden, bell-shaped pear, the Forelle has a freckled skin and red blush. Sweet and juicy, it is good for eating out of hand.

Nelis: This egg-shaped winter variety has russet-colored skin. It is a good choice for salads and snacks.

Seckel: You'll find this small egg-shaped pear in late summer and fall. It can vary in color, from dark green with a red blush to dark red all over. One of the sweetest types of pears, it is great for snacks or for pickling and canning whole.

### Buying and storing pears

When shopping for pears, look for fruit without bruises or cuts. Also, remember that skin color may not indicate ripeness. The color of some pear varieties does not significantly change during ripening.

For baking, look for pears that are fairly firm. If you plan to eat pears out of hand, look for those that yield to gentle pressure at the stem end.

To ripen too-firm pears at home, place them in a paper bag or a loosely covered bowl. Let them stand at room temperature for a few days. You can tell most varieties are ripe when they yield to gentle pressure at the stem end. However, yellow Bartlett pears become a bright yellow, and red Bartletts become a brilliant red when ripe. Once ripened, fresh pears keep well in the refrigerator for several days. They do not freeze well.

### Preparing pears

To decide whether pears should be peeled, follow these rules of thumb:

■ Leave the peel on for eating out of hand or for cutting into pieces for salads.  
■ For cooking pears in sauces, re-

move the peel, because the skin toughens and darkens as it cooks in liquid.

## Pinto beans star in Mexican entree

AP — Beans are getting a lot of attention in nutrition circles these days. An excellent source of fiber, good protein and very versatile, beans can give a new twist to some old favorites.

Pinto beans star in the following recipe that features a blend of bean sauce, roasted chilies and whipping cream. The dish is topped with whipping cream and anejo, a partly skimmed cheese.

### ENFRUJOLADAS

8 ounces (1 cup) dried pinto beans  
1½ quarts water  
½ onion  
1 teaspoon salt (optional)  
¼ teaspoon oregano  
1 tablespoon vegetable oil  
3 chiles poblanos, roasted, seeded and peeled, and cut into strips  
¼ medium white onion, chopped  
3 plum tomatoes, roasted and pureed  
¾ cup whipping cream or Mexican cream  
12 corn tortillas, lightly fried in oil  
2 ounces queso anejo or feta cheese, crumbled

For the bean sauce: Sort and rinse pinto beans. Place in a medium saucepan. Add water and onion; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; partially cover and simmer 45 minutes until tender. Add salt and oregano, continue to cook 15 minutes, adding additional hot water, if necessary. Place beans and bean broth in a blender; puree until just blended.

For the filling: In a skillet, heat oil. Sauté chili strips and chopped onion until tender. Stir in pureed tomato; cook over medium-high heat until thickened and reduced in half. Add ½ cup of the cream; stir until blended. Season to taste.

To assemble: Dip tortillas in bean sauce. Fill each tortilla with 2 tablespoons chili-tomato mixture; roll up. Place filled tortillas in a greased rectangular baking dish. Cover with remaining bean sauce. Top with remaining cream and cheese. Bake, covered, in a 350-degree F oven for 20 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Makes 8 servings.

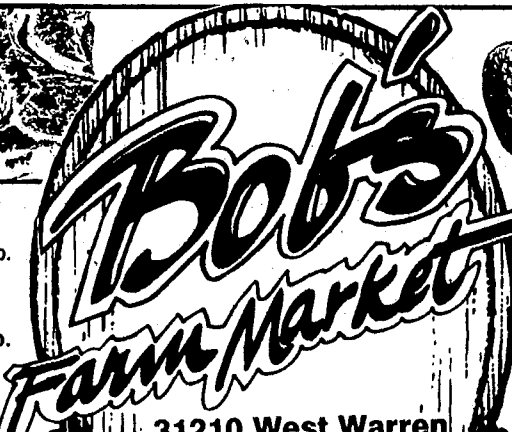

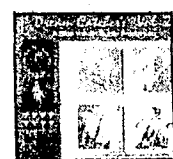

This release focuses attention Michigan talent that may have been heard before, but the release effectively showcases what creativity could be currently overlooked.

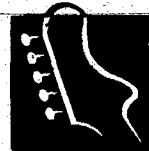

## Ash lights up his solo career



For Daniel Ash, it sometimes feels like he's been playing his songs for decades . . . with others. Now the singer/songwriter/guitarist is taking a timeout from his work with Love & Rockets to focus on his solo career.

Don't remind singer-songwriter-guitarist Daniel Ash about his long career. The musician who played with Bauhaus, Tones on Tail and Love & Rockets is well aware, thank you.

"It started in 1906 and I'm still going," Ash said with a laugh. Well, OK, it really started in the late 1970s.

During this leg of his career he's concentrating on his solo career which includes doing his first-ever solo tour. Sometimes, Ash found, preparing for the tour which supports his latest release "Foolish Thing Desire" and the previous

the usual studio grind, Ash tried a spontaneous approach with the release which was recorded in winter 1991. (Record company conflicts kept it from being released until recently.)

"I deliberately went in (to the studio) with no songs or music at all," he explained. "I just booked studio time. The whole record was a totally new way of working."

After writing the music with his band, Ash hid away and wrote the lyrics. He found this approach satisfying.

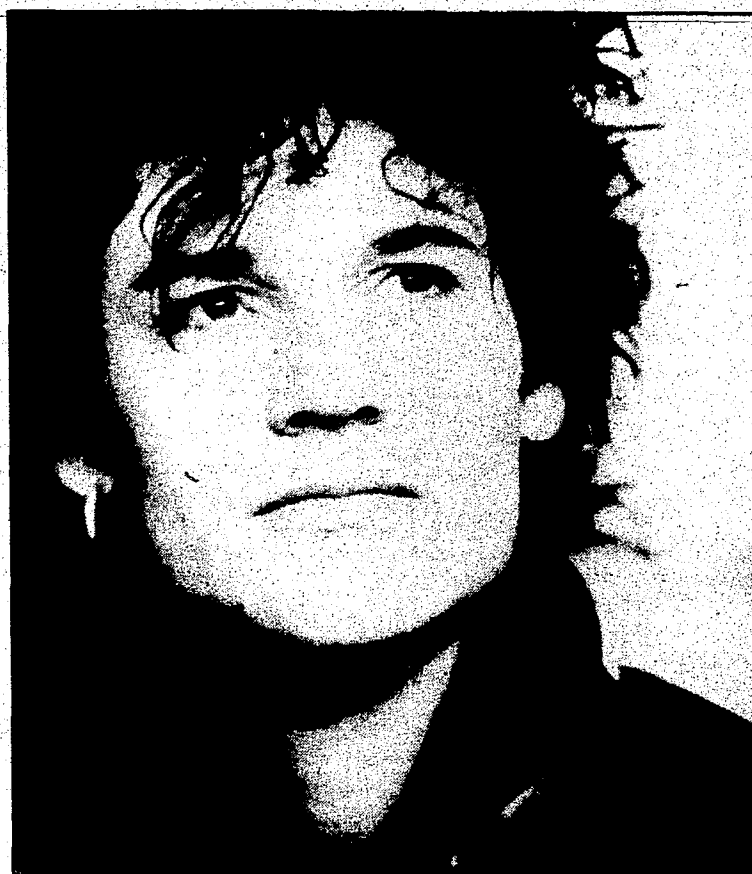
"The rewards were much greater," Ash said. "I didn't have time to think about it too much. I have this tendency to overanalyze things."

Early in his career, Ash tried another sort of experimental approach to songwriting. Upon meeting future Bauhaus member Peter Murphy, the two formed a band with Murphy singing a series of newspaper articles.

"After about 15 seconds, I knew we'd have some sort of success," said the 35-year-old musician.

"Four weeks after, we formed Bauhaus, and we recorded 'Bela Lugosi's Dead.'" The song was released in 1979.

The song, still active on alternative dance clubs' play lists, became the cornerstone of the Goth-rock cathedral. After nearly five years of recording and performing, Bauhaus broke up and Ash put together Tones on Tail with Bauhaus drummer Kevin Haskins. That group mutated into the highly influential Love & Rockets in 1985, when Bauhaus bassist and current solo

artist David J. came aboard.

Although on hiatus, Love & Rockets is still together. Like Bauhaus and Tones on Tail, the Love & Rockets needed time apart.

"We all wanted to do that," the Northampton, England, native explained. "We've been working with the same people for 12-13 years.

Going to do something else is really refreshing."

Tickets for the postponed Daniel Ash show from Thursday, Feb. 18, will be honored for his show on Friday, March 19, at St. Andrew's Hall, 431 E. Congress, Detroit. Doors open at 9 p.m. Must be 18 to enter. Call 961-MELT for more information.

"Coming Down," wracked his nerves like his stint with Tones on Tail.

"A lot of things were on my shoulders with that group," he said.

"That was the first time it was more of the pressure. This to me is the continuation of this sort of feeling."

To minimize the stress and maximize the enjoyment, Ash is keeping the tour short — only 20 gigs, which includes one at St. Andrew's Hall in Detroit on Friday, March 19. (His show scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 18, has been postponed.)

"I don't want to do like 30 or 40 gigs; I didn't want to do it when I was doing 30 or 40 gigs," he said. "You lose your enthusiasm for it."

Just when it seemed safe to say that '70s fashions were gone for good, they're back, sort of.

This spring you'll experience a fashion flashback with the reappearance of bell-bottoms and wide-legged pants, modified platform shoes and a lot in between. But this time around, the retro look comes in soft fabrics and wearable styles that appeal to more than teenagers.

Why the resurgence of a fashion look remembered for excess, harsh fabrics and clumsy footwear? Leading designers are "borrowing the carefree '70s attitude," but the look is all '90s, says Janice Hayes, Jacobson's public relations director.

"The re-interpretation of '70s fashions is much more feminine," she said. "Some designers go to the extreme, but most of the new fashions are versatile and easy to wear."

Bell-bottoms and palazzo pants, vests, ruffled tops, tunics, poorboy sweaters, midriffs and sheer garments all are back in a big way — this time in softer silhouettes (no pointy collars) and fluid fabrics, such as chiffon, crepe, silk, net, crochet, lace and macramé. This spring's colorful psychedelic prints and African motifs also are '70s-inspired.

Although the '70s look is in, polyester and other rigid fabrics that defy draping are about as out as hippies and disco dancing, fashion experts quickly point out.

Come spring, the menswear look, with heavy shoulder pads, pinstripes and severe tailoring will be replaced by longer, less tailored jackets, vests and tunics. Even open weave, embroidered and lace vests by Dior and Donna Karan can be worn to the office and layered with a lace T-shirt underneath, said Hayes.

"The '70s look is fun; it's diverse and allows great freedom of expression," she said.

This spring Jacobson's Signature and Miss J departments will carry bell-bottoms in hip-hugger and waisted styles, hemmed or frayed for a grunge look.

Youthful fashions, like the midriff and sheer evening wear by designers like Chanel and Claude Montana will reveal "lots of skin," said Hayes, who reports that cleavage is in for the '90s.

At City Limits in downtown Farmington, owners Roz Fierberg and Chris Merucci started selling wide-legged pants more than a year ago, about the time retro dressing caught on.

"The look is pretty and sophisticated," said Fierberg. "You can dress up a soft wide-legged pant by

# Matinee' recalls old days of horror

Lawrence Woolsey realizes that in 1962 it takes more than a good title to lure people away from their televisions and into theaters. For his new movie "Mant" (half man, half ant, all terror), he pulls out every gimmick in the book from Atomu-Vision to Rumble Rama to a Mant-suited teenager terrorizing the aisles.

"Matinee," slowly building an audience after a couple of weeks in general release, recalls the good old days when kids filled driveways and Saturday matinees to check out the latest trashy horror/sci-fi double bill. It also harkens back to a more real type of horror.

Woolsey, played by John Goodman, chooses Key West as the site for his new opening — "so the big studios won't steal his latest ideas," he says. He blows into town early, stirring up publicity and wiring the theater with a number of new gadgets. The Bay of Pigs crisis, which sends the

Florida town into a tizzy, only works to his advantage.

"We show them their worst possible nightmare," Woolsey says, "and then we destroy it. They go home knowing that this time anyway the battle has been won."

The movie captures this high-water mark of the Cold War, where a stone-faced JFK addresses fellow Americans about the possible threat of nuclear attack from Cuba. Residents clear supermarket shelves to fill bomb shelters while students practice the art of duck and cover.

The real Lawrence Woolsey has always winced at the thought of messages in their movies. They would tell you that their sole objective was always how to lure teenagers in, often thinking up the titles and ad campaigns long before writing the scripts.

Woolsey becomes an amalgamation of these B-movie moguls. The gut and cigar (not to mention epic frugality) recalls Sam Arkoff,

head of American International Pictures (AIP), who made a fortune off the steady stream of beach, biker and monster movies he and partner James Nicholson released in the 1960s.

Woolsey also possesses the technical wizardry of producer/director William Castle, king of the gimmicks. He was the first to offer shock buzzers beneath the seats, ghosts flying above the audience, or the opportunity to make out a will before seeing his latest scarefest.

"Matinee" director Joe Dante also cut his teeth in B-grade exploitation. He made "Piranha" for Roger Corman before hooking up with Steven Spielberg and "Gremlins."

Movie fans will find half the fun in the details. Vintage posters line the walls of the old movie theater. Dick Miller, an AIP mov-

ie regular, teams with independent director John Sayles as shills who stir up audience interest by insisting that "Mant" threatens the town's decency.

A coming attractions preview for "Mant" opens the film and provides the best spoof, with Woolsey introducing the movie Hitchcock-style and even ripping off the trademark profile in silhouette. Later clips from the movie resurrect actors like "Invasion of the Body Snatchers" Kevin McCarthy to battle the title monster as it scales the sides of buildings.

Despite its insider cleverness and message, you get the feeling that something else could have been done with "Matinee." The teenage relationships are surprisingly ordinary nostalgic sitcom stuff while the idea that the young horror movie nut could really learn the ropes from an old pro like Woolsey had the most unmined promise.

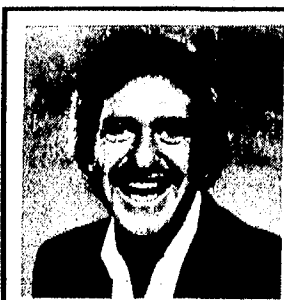

wearing a ruffled top or dress it down with a plain T-shirt for the beach."

City Limits, an off-price store, began to stock psychedelic cotton tops and '70s-inspired print skirts by Reference Point, Art Works, Live in Color and other makers right after Christmas. The owners expect the look to be popular because of its versatile style and fabric options.

Says M.J. Burns, Hudson's fashion director, who grew up in the '70s: "I loved the ('70s) fash-

ions when I was a preteen, but my mother wouldn't let me wear everything I wanted. I'm still young enough, so this season I'm embellishing my wardrobe with everything."



Mike Slone doesn't consider it a boast when he speaks confidently of his three-point shooting ability.

His desperation triple with one second remaining Friday night gave host Plymouth Salem a 61-60 victory over Westland John Glenn in a matchup between two of Observerland's top basketball teams.

"I'm not being conceited, but I just don't think you can say it's luck for me," Slone said. "If I see someone open, I'll pass. But I had my head down and was looking for the shot myself."

## Franklin unplugs Chargers for 51-46 triumph

There were plenty of distractions Friday for the Livonia Franklin basketball team.

But the most important business at hand was trying to stay out of the basement in the Western Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

It was Parents Night and a homecoming dance to follow, but the biggest nemesis was crosstown rival Livonia Churchill, which couldn't spoil the evening, falling to the host Patriots, 51-46.

Franklin improved to 5-9 overall and 2-7 in the WLAA, while the Chargers fell to 2-12 and 1-8.

The Patriots jumped out to a quick lead and led by as much as nine (34-25) midway through the third quarter before Churchill rallied to close the score to 34-31 entering the fourth quarter.

"We had an eight-point lead and I wanted to get some kids in the game that usually don't see a lot of minutes," said Franklin coach Dan Kennedy.

"We wound up letting them back in the game. And when you get a team like Churchill — who is scrappy as heck — it turns out to be anybody's game in the fourth."

The fourth quarter, easily the most — and only — entertaining quarter of the game, saw both

teams trade baskets.

Churchill closed the margin to 40-39 with 4:41 left on a three-pointer by forward Drew Jurcisin. Franklin's Greg Maple countered with a triple.

"We could never get rid of them," Kennedy said. "We got on top early but didn't do a good job on our press and had to rely on our half-court defense."

"They were tough," said center Jason Meixner. "I thought we'd take off but we couldn't put the nail in the coffin."

After a layup by Darrell Wiacek cut the lead back to one, Meixner made a perfect pass under the basket to Jason Facinoe. The senior forward converted the assist and was fouled. His ensuing free throw gave the Patriots a 46-41 advantage with 3:13 remaining.

Two Jurcisin foul shots narrowed the margin to three. But Churchill wasted two opportunities to score by failing to convert consecutive front-ends of one-and-one free throw tries.

A foul shot by Meixner and two more by Clem Herrera expanded the lead back to six, but Jurcisin came back with another three-pointer.

"(Jurcisin) came out of nowhere," Kennedy said. "I told the team that anything he throws up is going to go in so we have to help out on him."

After Facinoe missed a free throw, the Chargers

had the ball with 27 seconds to go, but Jurcisin finally missed. His errant shot landed in the hands of Meixner, who fed Paul Kruschka for an easy layup as time expired.

"I don't think we played well all game, especially on defense," said Churchill coach Tom Lang. "But we had our opportunities and just screwed up late in the game."

Meixner, a 6-foot-5, 240-pound senior, was a force under the basket all game as he scored five points, grabbed 10 rebounds and blocked four shots. Kruschka led the Patriots with 12 points, while Facinoe and Herrera added nine each.

Jurcisin's 15 points led the Chargers. Mark Rutherford added 11, while Wiacek and Jason Renkiewicz each added eight.

The loss left a sour taste in the mouth of Lang, who wasn't pleased with one statistic — the Chargers were two for six at the free throw line while the Patriots converted nine of their 15 foul shots.

"We didn't get to the free throw line until late in the third quarter," he said. "You can't tell me all those blocks were clean. I'm not saying the referees were bad, but they let them play. And when you let them play like that, the big kids are the ones who will benefit."

## Crusaders' wait continues after loss to Wolves, 72-49

Wolves' senior Teri King, a 1989 graduate of Plymouth Salem, scored

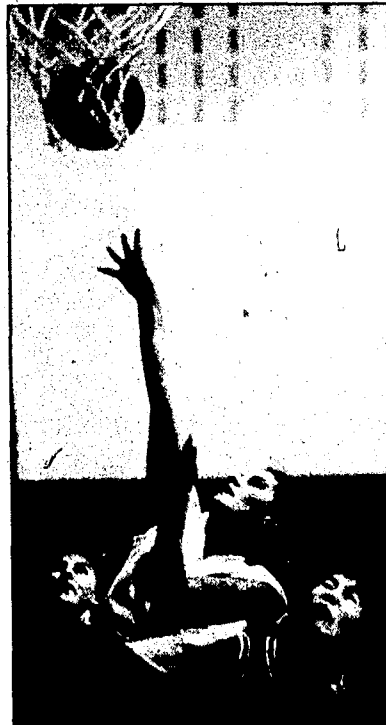
nine points and grabbed nine rebounds in her final home game. King said she wanted to prove an earlier 79-70 win over the Crusaders was no fluke.

# Wedding Planner Created With The Groom In Mind

There are many important duties for the groom to remember as the big day approaches. The best man, ushers and groom's parents can also make many contributions. Keep this guide for reference, and you'll be sure to remember every little detail!

## Groom:

- Buy an engagement ring.
- Choose your best man, groomsmen and ushers for the wedding.
- Have a list of people you want to invite to the wedding. Your family should make out their list as well.
- Choose a wedding present for the bride.
- Go with your fiancée to a formal wear shop to select outfits for you and the men in the wedding party.
- Select the wedding ring with your fiancée and allow time for sizing and engraving.
- Apply for a marriage license.
- If you're planning a traditional wedding, plan on paying for the bride's bouquet, going-away corsage, corsages for both mothers and other close female relatives on either side, and boutonnieres for yourself, groomsmen and ushers.
- Make insurance changes for yourself and your new spouse.
- Considerations should include life, personal property, household, medical and fire insurance.
- Be certain you and your fiancée have all necessary papers, blood tests, birth certificates, etc.
- Give the clergyman's fee to the best man the day of the wedding. He will then give it to the clergyman following the ceremony.
- Notify your attendants of the time and place of the wedding rehearsal.
- Plan your bachelor dinner several days before the wedding. The best man and ushers often prefer to host this.
- Be sure both you and your new spouse sign the wedding certificate before leaving on the honeymoon.
- Send a thank-you note or telegram to the bride's parents the day after the wedding.

## Best Man:

- Inform the ushers of any special seating arrangements during the rehearsal.
- Get the wedding ring the day of the ceremony.
- Check tickets, reservations, etc., for the honeymoon and be sure the groom has tickets when he leaves.
- Have marriage license and fee of clergyman ready the day of the wedding.
- Help the groom prepare for the ceremony. Make sure his bags are packed and his going-away clothes are ready.

- Accompany the groom to the wedding. Make sure you are there at least 15 minutes before the ceremony.
- Be timekeeper and toastmaster at the reception. Help the couple make their getaway at the appropriate time.

## Ushers:

- Be at the site of the wedding one hour before the start of the ceremony. The groom should have boutonnieres ready for you.
- Have a typed list of guests occupying reserved pews. Stand at the door and ask each arriving female guest if she is a friend of the

- bride or groom. Offer your right arm to the woman and escort her to her seat.
- Head usher escorts groom's mother to the front right-hand pew.
- Ushers escort all women in the front pews to the door. The bride's mother is first, then the mother of the groom, etc.
